

# Pastor's Corner Rev Howard Gaston

The origins of Vacation Bible School can be traced back to Hopedale, Illinois in 1894. Sunday school teacher D. T. Miles felt she was limited by time constraints in teaching the Bible to children. So, she started a daily Bible school to teach children during the summer. The first Bible school enrolled forty students and lasted four weeks.

In 1898 Virginia Sinclair Hawes (often identified as "Mrs. Walker Aylett Hawes"), director of the children's department at Epiphany Baptist Church in New York City, started an "Everyday Bible School" for neighborhood children during the summer at a rented beer parlor in New York's East Side.

Dr. Robert Boville of the Baptist Mission Society, became aware of the Hawes' summer program and recommended it to other Baptist churches. Boville established a handful of summer schools which were taught by students at the Union Theological Seminary. During one summer, one thousand students were enrolled in five different schools. In 1922, he founded the World Association of Daily Vacation Bible School. One year later, Standard Publishing produced the very first printed VBS curriculum. Enough material was provided for a five-week course for three age levels (kindergarten, primary, and junior).

So VBS has been around in one form or another for over 120 Years. It has taken on many different forms too. I remember when VBS was two weeks long. Many of you here have fond memories of The Green Mountain Camp that went on for a number of years. But no matter what the form of the VBS the message I believe continues to be the same, learning and loving Jesus more.

While the message is the same, some things have changed. For example, in the 1860's the new gadgets were the camera and the bicycle. While these inventions were around for several years, they gained in popularity. Today the camera is an app on an iPhone that almost every child has.

So how does that affect VBS? It is affected in some ways and in the important way, not at all. The message still is learning and loving Jesus more. But a 4-week program won't work, neither will a 2-week program. That is why I asked you about the different formats for VBS. Most of us went with a once a week format for 4 weeks hoping that we might attract more of our neighbors to VBS. While all the details are not in place yet, the Committee is moving towards doing this format. We plan to hold VBS at the West Barnet building with the possibility of holding the last meeting at the beach sometime at the end of the summer.

What we will need is you. This church has been great about supporting VBS over the years. Last year we had around 29 volunteers! That is great and this year we will need all of us to help in some way.

I look forward to you sharing this new adventure with us by sharing the same message in a new way.

## Barnet Center Bible School (not so long ago) Celina Wright

I spoke to a few people who attended Green Mountain Camp in the late 40s through the early 60s, including David Warden, Priscilla Paquette, and Edee Thurston (my mom). GMC was for a full week and included children age 10 to 16 from many area Presbyterian churches: including Greensboro, Granville, Burlington and the Ryegate churches.

This was a mission of the Barnet Center churchthe kids paid very little, maybe \$10, to spend a week at camp (which probably barely covered the cost of food!). The adults volunteered their time and some came back year after year from other Churches. Sometimes, former campers would come back as volunteer counselors.

This was before the back room and bathroom were added (in 1966) at the Center Vestry. The years varied, sometimes the girls stayed in the barn at the Parsonage, and the boys slept on cots in a large tent put up in back of the church. Or the boys slept in the barn and the girls stayed in the house at the Parsonage. The bathroom in the house at the Parsonage was available, but the campers also used an outhouse up at the Church.

The days were structured with Bible classes, outdoor activities, meals ("good food", by all accounts), quiet/rest time and Vespers before bedtime every evening were held outside. Some years the campers were bused (or piled into the back of a pickup) to go swimming at Harvey's Lake. There were KP and other duties. There was a lot of singing, and a lot of walking up and down that hill from the Parsonage to the Church. There may have been a campfire, or a hike, or maybe a trip to the museum on a rainy day.

The participants all remembered large groups of campers, estimating probably 40 to 50 kids. The best memories seem to be meeting youth from other places, some of which seemed to be very far away at that time. Priscilla said "The kids from Burlington wore makeup and nail polish, and had never seen an outhouse!"

The influence that Church Camp had on all these participants was undeniable. My mom was so excited when we bought a house in Barnet - because of her fond memories from years before of Green Mountain Camp.
